At KNGS we have had a fantastic start to the year. There is a relaxed, purposeful and determined atmosphere in school and from talking to students and staff and visiting them in their lessons I can confirm that they have settled in well, are working hard, taking pride in their work and learning. Thank you for continuing to support and encourage your children in all aspects of school life.

This half term students have extended their learning outside the classroom with two geography field trips, history students have visited the Globe Theatre in London and enrichment activities have taken place with Birmingham University. Sporting events have started well with successes in



the South Birmingham Cross Country Championships and several netball competitions. In school Dyslexia Awareness Week engaged us in a variety of exciting and informative activities and we are delighted to have welcomed German exchange students from Melle, we all learn so much from these cultural exchanges.

Particular congratulations to KS4 Food Preparation and Nutrition students who have been selected to exhibit at the National SSAT (Specialist, Schools and Academies Trust) conference in December. I am also delighted to announce that we have been recognised, as a school by The Society of Authors for our commitment to reading for pleasure.

This academic year we have a record number of extra-curricular and enrichment activities taking place and to ensure everyone has an opportunity to take part, we are running an Extra-Curricular Fair in the Hall at lunchtime on Friday 16th November - please encourage your child to go along to see which extra-curricular clubs and activities are on offer for them to sign up to.

As you are aware our GCSE and A Level results in 2018 were excellent (see page 8) and we can now confirm that the GCSE results put us in the top 3% of all schools nationally (top 4% in 2017). We now have a record number of 220 Sixth Form students on role, 54 of whom are now boys, we are very much looking forward to seeing the start of the Sixth Form building construction. I will be writing to you with full details as soon as these are confirmed and will continue to provide weekly updates of activity to you and our neighbours via the website and on Twitter () @KNGSlife.

If your child is in Year 11, please do attend our "Meet the Sixth Form" Event on 21st November, this is a fantastic opportunity to talk to students about the A Level subjects they are studying, sixth form life and the support and careers advice available for all future pathways (apprenticeships, University, bespoke OXBRIDGE course, employment and gap years) as well as an opportunity to look more closely at plans for the new Sixth Form building.

### **KNGS RANKS IN TOP 3% OF COUNTRY**

With National School Performance Tables published last week, Kings Norton Girls' School is delighted to confirm it is ranked in the top 3% of all schools in the country.

The Performance Tables included the 'Progress 8' measure which looks at the progress each student makes from Year 7 through to Year 11. Our 'Progress 8' Score of 0.73 places us at 183<sup>rd</sup> out of 6530 school nationally and 6<sup>th</sup> across the city. These numbers include selective schools.

KNGS is also positioned in the top 5% for Attainment 8 (a measure of overall attainment) with a score of



57.1 positioning us significantly above Birmingham and national averages of 45.7 and 44.3 respectively.

In relation to the schools performance measure of EBacc average point score, at 5.26 we again exceeded local authority averages of 3.98 and national average of 3.83, again putting KNGS in the top 5% of schools in the country for this measure. The EBacc score measures the average grade of students across English, Maths, Science, a Modern Foreign Language and Humanities subject.

Following on from an outstanding set of exam results in the summer, these performance measures continue to confirm the achievements of students at Kings Norton Girls' School.

A Level results were also excellent with 25% of all A Level grades at A\*- A, exceeding our target of 17.5 %. In addition, 55% of all A Level grades were A\*- B and an average A Level Grade B-. All students continued on their chosen pathways with 35% of those going to university attending Russell Group Universities.

We are extremely proud of these results and I believe they are a reflection of the hard work, resilience and determination of our students and staff. A huge thank you to all staff for their care, support and for instilling the self-belief which I believe is a significant factor in the success at KNGS.

### YEAR 11 INVITED TO 'WEAR IT SMART'

### **WEDNESDAY 21ST NOVEMBER**

On Wednesday 21st November Year 11 students are invited to 'wear it smart' for the day. This means they are allowed to attend school in business dress as if they are in our Sixth Form. Normal school uniform can be worn as normal if preferred.



### **Careers Fair**

During the day there will be a Careers Fair for them to attend and in addition from 3.30pm until 5pm they are invited to 'Meet the Sixth Form' to find out more about the impressive range of A Level courses directly from current students and teachers at Kings Norton Sixth Form.

### **New Sixth Form Building**

It's a really exciting time for our Sixth Form. Following excellent results in 2018 we are about to start building our brand new Sixth Form Centre. It is scheduled to be ready for the Autumn Term, meaning our current Year 11 will be the first to benefit from the specialist facilities for the duration of their Sixth Form life.

**Applications for Sixth Form are already open**. Forms are available from the Learning Hub, Sixth Form website and will also hopefully be available soon as on on-line form.

The deadline for applications is 25th January, with a preferred deadline of <u>29th November for Internal KNGS</u> Applicants.


We look forward to Year 11 'wearing it smart' on 21st November and applying to Kings Norton Sixth Form.

### ANTI BULLYING

### **Our Progress Towards Gaining an Anti-Bullying Quality Mark**

In the May newsletter we shared the winning anti-bullying logo design by Eve Godsal (S-5) with you, this has now been professionally art worked and is ready to use.

In October the new anti-bullying policy was approved by Governors and will be accessible on the website after half term. Students contributed to this new policy by coming up with their definition of 'what is bullying?' N5 and N8's definition was selected, amalgamated and shared with governors for use in the new policy:





The development of new internal procedures to resolve occasional issues of bullying have also been implemented in support of the new policy. At the start of term students discussed two key aspects of how bullying could be resolved. These are:

**Mediation** – use of a staff or peer mediator to work with all parties in conflict to agree successful resolutions.

Restorative practice – a strategy that seeks to repair relationships that have been damaged.

There were many different views on how these could work and discussions about the structure of these processes. The students' views have all been taken into account. In November students will discuss further how the new policy and procedures will operate in school.

One of the new processes to support to the target of bullying which we will be offering is self empowerment. This may also include the offer of external agency support.

There will be a number of events in school across the year to promote anti-bullying including another 'Odd Sock Day', so look out for updates on these events!

### **GEORGRAPHY FIELD-WORK**

### **Year 11 Visit Shropshire**

This term began very busily for our Year 11 GCSE Geography students who carried out their final piece of field-work for their Paper 2 exam. 77 students went to Carding Mill Valley in Shropshire on Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> September, to study the changing river characteristics and flood risk along Ashbrook stream.

Sadly we were not blessed with good weather in the morning,



but it brightened up in the afternoon and the students did not let this affect their spirits; wellies on and waterproofs zipped up, they collected their data superbly. They waded into the stream to take key measurements on width, depth and speed and hiked up the very steep valley to finds the source of the stream! The students came away with an excellent understanding of how the river channel changed as we moved down stream and also what factors can increase the risk of flooding. The students were a credit to the school and we gathered valuable data to take back to school for further analysis.


### **WORLD DYSLEXIA AWARENESS DAY**

### SLS SCHOOL LIBRARY AWARD - GOLD AWARD

We are also delighted to announce that the Learning Hub at KNGS has been award the SLS School Library Gold Award.

This award is achieved through completion of a self-assessment process conducted by the Head of Library and Research and endorsed by the Headteacher. The process involved auditing 20 key activities and providing documentation as evidence. The Gold Award is only award to high-achieving services as it is only awarded if over 15 of the activities are met.

### SIXTH FORM STUDY SKILLS PROGRAMME

During the first seven weeks of the Autumn Term all Year 12 students have completed the Sixth Form Study Skills Programme. The programme involves five skills sessions taught by the Head of Library and Research, these include Organisation and Timekeeping, Note-taking, Research and Website

Evaluation, Critical Thinking and Academic Writing and

Referencing. It also includes two employability skills sessions which are being run by mentors from Lloyds Banking Group. All of these sessions are intended to demonstrate the importance of mastering different study techniques which they can use both in their lessons and for revision.

### APPLICATIONS FOR SIXTH FORM



### 16-19 BURSARY FUND

The Bursary Fund is designed to help support those young people who face the greatest barriers to continuing in education or training post 16. The level of support offered may vary during the academic year and is dependent on the amount of funds available. Students will need to complete an application form and supply evidence of need or eligibility as appropriate before assistance is provided.

**Additional help:** Under exceptional circumstances students who are not automatically eligible for an award can also apply for help with one off course related expenses (proof of income or hardship will be asked for). Applications for additional help will be considered on an individual basis and is dependent upon available funds. Application forms are available from the Sixth Form Common Room or can be obtained by contacting Miss Zoe Nelmes, Sixth Form Administrator.



### **DESTINATIONS & CELEBRATING SUCCESS**

We are very proud of our students' achievements and every year we will celebrate with a formal A Level Certificate Presentation in December. This year has seen a fantastic number of students go on to study at University.

Of the cohort of 83 students 78% secured places at universities, of which 35% are Russell Group universities. We look forward to catching up with students on 21<sup>st</sup> December to celebrate their well-deserved successes.

To celebrate the end of their studies with us, Year 13 held their Leaver's Ball at the beginning of June. This year it took place at the NEC. It was a wonderful event which students and staff thoroughly enjoyed!



### YEAR 12 HISTORY TRIP TO BERLIN

In July 2018, the Year 12 history students visited Berlin for two days as part of their research into the causes of the Holocaust.



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The trip involved visits to the Reichstag, The Wannsee Conference Centre and The Jewish Museum, as well as a walking tour of Berlin.

The trip was well worth it. The students gained new and original sources to use in their coursework and it really helped to put their research into a wider context.

### SUMMER SCHOOL - UNIVERSITY OF BIRMINGHAM

On the first week of the summer holidays, we attended a Microbiology and Infection Summer School at the University of Birmingham. The competitive application process meant we were selected alongside 22 other students out of 60-70 applicants from across the UK and even Australia!

The week was invaluable - not only did it open our eyes to the world of bacteria invisible to us, but it gave us a chance to learn about biology outside of the A Level specification and participate in high level tasks such as a second year practical on DNA separation. We also had a chance to take samples from our houses, allowing us to identify exactly what microorganisms are lurking in even the simplest of places such as a door knob



and our phone screens. However, the focus wasn't just on the germs; we even had the opportunity to produce art pieces using fluorescent bacteria. Throughout, we were supported by lecturers and existing students who all really did push us, giving a true representation of what being a student scientist truly consists of. We would really recommend this experience to anybody that has an interest in the biological world around us.

### **GEOGRAPHY FIELD STUDY**

On Sunday September 30<sup>th</sup>, 19 Year 13 students travelled to Nettlecombe Field Study Centre to collect data for their NEA investigation (worth 20% of their A Level). On day one the team set out for Watchet, a small regenerated coastal town and practiced collecting data to provide ideas on a human based field study. On day two the students got to visit the lovely seaside town of Minehead, unfortunately not to do any sunbathing, but they took part in the more exhilarating measurement of beach profiles and assessing the effectiveness of the coastal management in place. On day three the students set out to collect the data in the area of their choice based on the enquiry question that they came up with. Despite the difficult conditions and long hours that made it a somewhat challenging task, the students kept their focus and collected a range of excellent data for their



study. The group were a credit to the school and we gathered valuable data to take back to school for further analysis.

### YEAR 12 BIOLOGY TRIP TO DEVON

The sun shone on the biologists as they worked hard in Devon, conducting practical experiments to support their learning of A Level Biology. On the first day we headed to East Prawle, an area ideal to study the distribution of organisms on the rocky shore. Many students were experiencing their first taste of rock pooling whilst gathering their data on the iPads from the Field Study Centre. The data gathered was then mapped onto satellite images and our students conducted statistical tests on the data gathered. Day 2 saw us carrying out chromatography to identify photosynthetic pigments within the different types of seaweeds, and how they were adapted for their function and habitat, then down to Slapton Sands where we used belt transects to study the biological succession across the coastline, we were also able to compare the results to last year's data to see what the environmental impact was of Storm Emma. On our final day we were sampling in the freshwater ley, which allowed us to practice skills gathered from previous days and to use our own data for some statistical tests. The students enjoyed their trip, it gave them opportunity to apply their knowledge to unfamiliar situations and experience new things.

### DARKER NIGHTS, HAPPY & SAFE HALOWEEN/BONFIRE NIGHT

With the darker nights fast approaching, it is important that students are reminded what we, as a school community, expect of them in terms of behaviour. Whilst we hope they will enjoy socialising with friends and family during the half-term break and the upcoming Halloween/Bonfire Night activities, we also want to ensure they feel confident to keep themselves safe and away from danger, crime and anti-social behaviour.

In partnership with the police, we would like to remind our students about the following:-

**Anti-social behavior:** Halloween can be a scary time for people who don't like surprises or callers at their door. Think about how your actions and behaviour affect others; elderly and vulnerable people may be frightened by 'trick or treat' so look out for signs in windows that people do not want callers at their door.

**Personal Safety:** Be aware of your surroundings, take care of friends and family members and keep valuables such as phones out of public view whenever possible.

Don't drink alcohol, take illegal drugs or unknown substances; they can have a big impact on your health and safety, behaviour and your ability to do well at school and enjoy other interests and activities. They can also be addictive and have unpredictable side effects, including sudden death!

**Weapons in public places:** carrying a knife will get you a criminal record which can have life-long effects on travel and job prospects. Those who carry knives are also much more likely to be injured by them.

**Off-road bikes:** these can only be ridden if taxed, insured and driven on private land with the landowner's permission. Don't risk your life and future prospects by illegally riding these on the road.

**Remember the company you keep:** if your friend breaks the law, you may also be held responsible for that crime – even if you weren't the one directly responsible.
