EVENTS, TRIPS & CLUBS

YEAR 7 SPACE CENTRE TRIP

The Science Department took Year 7 to the National Space Centre in Leicester on June 30th. As well as a visit to the Sir Patrick Moore planetarium, the students took part in a workshop looking at the science behind rockets and visited the many new exhibitions and installations on show. This was our largest ever trip there, with the vast majority of students in Year 7 taking part. This made for a busy visit, as two other schools were in attendance, but our students' behaviour was excellent.

YEAR 10 GEOGRAPHY FIELDTRIPS



This term is a busy one for our Year 10 GCSE Geography students who have 2 fieldtrips to conduct and practice fieldwork techniques in order to support their Geography Paper 2 GCSE Exam.

On 23rd May, their first fieldtrip focused on investigating 'how quality of life changes across an urban area'. We



visited 3 contrasting wards across Birmingham to carry out our fieldwork; Bournville, Selly Oak and Highgate, catching the train between all three. We gathered data on the environmental quality, traffic levels, services and interviewed local people to

find out what it is like to live in their area. Using this data and their secondary research from class and homework, the students were able to both describe and explain the changes across their city. Data was collected to a very high standard and the students were a credit to the school. Their respect and approach to their fieldwork was exemplary, a successful and enjoyable day was had by all.

Year 10 GCSE Geography students then carried out their final piece of field-work on Tuesday 11th July for their Paper 2 exam. 68 Year 10 students went to Carding Mill Valley in Shropshire to study the changing river characteristics and flood risk along Ashbrook stream. Sadly, we were not blessed with good weather all day but we did have bouts of sunshine, and importantly the students did not let the weather affect their spirits; wellies on and waterproofs zipped up, the students collected their data superbly. They carefully measured width, depth and speed and produced some lovely field sketches. One group made



it to the source of the stream to ensure we had a wealth of data from upstream to downstream, for our efforts we enjoyed the beautiful view and a sense of achievement. Despite a long delay on our journey back due to a crash on the M6, the students remained positive. Overall, the students showed great focus and resilience and came away with an

resilience and came away with an excellent understanding of river changes and flood risk. We also now have valuable data for further analysis.

The students were a credit to the school, well done Year 10 Geographers!



HEARING IMPAIRED WORKSHOP

On Tuesday 11th July, the morning began with students from Selly Park Girls', and another student from another school meeting the pupils from KNGS. All the students have a hearing impairment and the idea was to get the pupils to socialise with each other. Some of the students had met last year, so there were some familiar faces.

We were also joined by the teacher for the Deaf, Davina who spoke about how they could share experiences, and introduced the day's speakers. They listened to a college student guest speaker called Hannah who spoke about her experiences and how she is managing really well despite

her hearing difficulties. They loved listening to her as she was warm and funny and inspiring.

Next, Olivia Parmar from our Sixth Form, spoke about finding out in Year 7 about her hearing loss and how she's managed in school and was very encouraging to them all, and they could see how having a hearing impairment won't get in the way of studying and playing sport, as Liv is very involved in football.

Finally a deaf lady told them her life experiences and then taught them the signing alphabet and several words which the pupils all wanted to do, joined in with and enjoyed. Next year they want to do all day!

extremely well attended by students and their families from all of the schools across the Network.


We are enormously proud of the dedication and enthusiasm of our students whose work was on show.

VISIT FROM STEVE McCABE MP

On Friday the 16th of June, just after sitting my last politics A Level exam I heard Steve McCabe the Labour MP for our area was in school. I immediately knew I wanted to speak with him as he is someone who can represent our student and young peoples voices. As our MP he has the power to influence and change our student experience.

Whilst studying politics A Level, we looked at reasons why political engagement varies between different demographic groups. We found older people are more engaged with politics whereas young people from the ages 18-24 have low voter turnouts. So I posed a question to Mr McCabe around political engagement in young people and why he thought the low rates occurred and what he feels can be done about it? He responded with an array of ideas, some of which were Labour plans generally. These were

- to ensure policies considered young people and a bill may be passed making it compulsory to consider its impact on the future generations
- More enrichment plans in schools to help build and shape our young minds.
- Building upon previous 'pizza and politics' which has been held for young people to interact with politics. He did mention he was surprised about the mountainous turnouts to these small events.

He also appreciated the pressure of GCSE's and A Levels are huge and an issue that needed some consideration if Labour were to win the next election.

To sum up, it was very intriguing to hear his thoughts and plans for the future. As a Politics A Level student I am fascinated by the world of politics in which he resides! YEAR 10 VISIT KARL BLOSSFELDT AT THE MAC

YEAR 10 & 12 COMPUTER SCIENCE TRIP

Year 10 & 12 Computer Science students, got a taste of codebreaking and history of past computing this term with our first ever visit to the world famous Bletchley Park - home of the codebreakers.

We left school early, full of excitement, keen to learn some history and get hands on experience of computers from the past.

First, students got the chance to explore Bletchley Park, gaining an understanding of it's deep history and impact on government intelligence. They got a great insight into the roles of different people (particularly women) within the war effort - many of which were not know until the 1990's when details of the impressive work became public knowledge.

Students then had a guided tour around the site by our wonderful guide Harold - who broke into character via costumes and accents at every stop - very entertaining!

Students then took part in a workshop that linked to their studies on encryption - past, present and future. This also gave them a chance to use a real, working German Enigma machine - with only 300 left in the world and worth over £300,000 it was a really rare chance and one we are sure they'll never forget.

From there it was a stop via the National Computing Museum - a wealth of working historic machines, including the worlds only working examples of The Bombe, Tunny and Colossus - along with some really interesting talks from the very people who have refurbished and maintained them. Well worth a visit!

Students found examples of technology that they didn't know existed and got to grips with technology they had seen - but didn't know how to use - such as rotary dial phones, PDAs, floppy disk drives and even PacMan!

Students left with knowledge and inspiration of our computing past, our present and looking forward to our Quantum Computing future.

A big thanks must also go out to Mr Steele and Miss Welch for supporting the running of the trip.


