

All the pupils seemed to enjoy the experience and hopefully it kick-started their reading for the Readathon, which finishes on Friday 2 May 2025.




AN INSPECTOR CALLS


CHARITY BAKE SALE

A MAJOR SUCCESS FOR BOXY BOOTS!

The Young Enterprise group, has worked in collaboration with Solihull Moors Football Club to plan a successful fundraising event for their business, Boxy Boots. The marketing team at Boxy Boots worked hard to design boot collection boxes, a pull-up display board, promotional leaflets, and advertisements to raise awareness about their boot donation initiative at Solihull Moors FC.

During the Solihull Moors vs. Yeovil football match, students hosted a stand at the ground and organised a quiz competition for children. The quiz aimed to highlight the large number of football boots that end up in landfills and emphasise the importance of recycling and sustainability. prize for the competition. Additionally, the students delivered a presentation to guests in the hospitality lounge, sharing insights into their business model and future plans.






Intermediate Mathematical Challenge 2025

This term 32 Year 10 students participated in the UKMT Intermediate maths challenge. It is a 60-minute, 25 multiple choice challenge. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency to make students think. The problems on the Intermediate Maths Challenge are designed to make students think mathematically.

Example question with solution:





SOLUTION Because angles on a straight line add up to 180° , we have $\angle PRQ = (180 - y)^{\circ}$. Because the triangle PQR is isosceles with PQ = PR, we can now deduce that $\angle PQR = \angle PRQ =$ $(180 - y)^{\circ}$. Therefore, because the angles in a triangle add up to 180°, it follows that x + (180 - y) + (180 - y) = 180This last equation may be rearranged to give and hence For $\frac{y}{z}$ to be as large as possible, x must be as small as possible. For x = 1, 2 and 3, $\frac{90}{x}$ is an integer, and hence $\frac{y}{x}$ is not an integer. However, for x = 4, $\frac{y}{r} = \frac{90}{4} + \frac{1}{2} = \frac{45}{2} + \frac{1}{2} = 23.$ Hence this is the largest possible value of $\frac{y}{z}$

STUDENTS FINANCE 2015

As our students are starting to receive offers from universities and we emailed the following advice from the from the Student Loans Company (SLC) website to them. SLC is encouraging prospective students to starting planning their student finance as Student Finance England (SFE) launches its mailing list. The full-time,undergraduate application service for the 25/26 academic year is expected to open in March 2025, and by signing up, students will be among the first to receive an email when the application service goes live.



SLC advises students to apply as early as possible for their student finance, even if they don't have a confirmed place on their course. This helps to ensure that their funding is in place at the start of term.
