





#### YEAR 12 VISIT TO BIRMINGHAM UNIVERSITY

Year 12 Physics students were recently given an amazing trip to the nuclear physics facilities at Birmingham University and the QE Hospital.

The group had the chance to see a range of university facilities including particle accelerators that they have learnt about in lessons. These accelerators are used for research in many different areas, whether it is medical physics, or understanding how to mix paint efficiently! We were also shown the university's new 'Neutron Therapy' machine, which has been designed as a new type of radiotherapy. This machine is the first of its kind in the UK and will be used in Birmingham for research which will help improve cancer treatment here in the future.



Students were then taken on a tour of facilities in the QE Hospital where they were able to see other particle accelerators being used in real life applications, treating patients with cancer. This included a visit to the Cyber Knife suite - one of only a handful of such machines in the UK, which provide life-saving treatment to many patients.

Patients using this machine need to have a special mask made for them, so that they can be held in exactly the same place for each treatment, and some lucky students were able to have their own mask made for them so we could really understand the process!

A huge amount of work was put into organising this by Dr Heyes of the Radiotherapy Physics Department at the QE Hospital, so many thanks go to him for arranging such a unique visit.


#### **SUMMER READING/WRITING BINGO CHALLENGE**


#### BIOLOGY & GEOGRAPHY YEAR 12 FIELD TRIP

The geographers developed a wide range of skills and collected much of the data needed to complete their non-exam assessment, while the biologists consolidated their knowledge of biodiversity and ecosystems by carrying out a wide range of real-life ecology investigations. Between the two groups they visited an intensive pig farm, free-range cattle farm, woodland,



river and coastal ecosystems, areas

Here's to making this a new tradition at KNGS - and to even bigger celebrations in the years ahead!



### **Successes**

#### KNGS CHEF MANAGER SCOOPS NATIONAL AWARD

KNGS Chef Manager, Andre Alto from Kings Norton Girls School (OCS Group Ltd) has been crowned the winner of the Grab 'N' Go Challenge, which is sponsored by SchoolGrid, following a live cook-off against two other school chefs at the Main Event.

The competition challenged school chefs to design, cook and serve a nutritious food item that can be eaten 'on-the-go' by youngsters. Chefs were tasked to cook four portions of a grab & go meal or breaktime savoury snack with a total cost per head of 80p (to include food costs and serving item- box, cone, paper wrapping) in just 40 minutes. Andre's winning dish was a longganisa rice burger.





#### YEAR 7 GEOGRAPHERS - SUSTAINABLE WATER PROJECT

"For our project, we come up with an idea to help save and recycle water. Our group created a simple and affordable method that could work in countries that don't have access to expensive technology like desalination plants. We believe our idea could be a great new way to recycle water in developing and poorer countries.

Our method is called *Pasteurised Sieving*. Here's how it works:

First, we collect rainwater in large water tanks. This is smart because rainwater doesn't have salt in it - salt is too heavy to evaporate - so it's already cleaner than seawater. This makes it easier and cheaper to clean, which is helpful for countries with fewer resources.

Once the rainwater is collected, we boil it in a large pan with a lid. The lid keeps the steam from escaping, which helps save water. Boiling the water kills most of the bacteria and germs. Then, we boil it again at a higher temperature to make sure any leftover bacteria are destroyed.



After boiling, we filter the water using a super fine sieve with tiny holes. These holes are so small that bacteria (even dead ones) can't get through, making the water safe to use.

Even in places where there isn't much rain, we think countries could work together and share this kind of system to help each other and protect the planet. Our idea is just the beginning, but we hope it can make a big difference."



#### **JUNIOR MATHEMATICAL CHALLENGE 2025**



This term 32 year 8 students participated in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge. It is a 60-minute, 25 multiple choice Challenge. A 60 minute, 25 multiple choice Challenge. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency to make students think. The problems on the Junior Maths Challenge are designed to make students think, most are accessible yet still challenge those with more experience.

#### **Example question:**

In the diagram, PQRS and JKLM are squares. Each corner of JKLM is one third of the way along an edge of PQRS. What is the ratio of the area of JKLM to the area of PQRS?


A 1:2

B 5:9

C 3:5

D 4:7

E 3:4



#### **Answer with working:**

Let the side-length of square *PQRS* be 3*l*.


Then the lengths of MP and PJ are 2l and l respectively.

Therefore, by Pythagoras' Theorem,

 $MJ^2 = MP^2 + PJ^2 = (2l)^2 + l^2 = 4l^2 + l^2 = 5l^2$ . So the area of square *JKLM* is  $5l^2$ .

Also, the area of square PQRS is  $(3l)^2 = 9l^2$ .

Hence the required ratio is  $5l^2 : 9l^2$ , that is 5 : 9.


#### **HOUSE NEWS**
